3.7.1 The institution employs competent faculty members qualified to accomplish the mission and goals of the institution. When determining acceptable qualifications of its faculty, an institution gives primary consideration to the highest earned degree in the discipline. The institution also considers competence, effectiveness, and capacity, including, as appropriate, undergraduate and graduate degrees, related work experiences in the field, professional licensure and certifications, honors and awards, continuous documented excellence in teaching, or other demonstrated competencies and achievements that contribute to effective teaching and student learning outcomes. For all cases, the institution is responsible for justifying and documenting the qualifications of its faculty. (See Commission guidelines "Faculty Credentials.") (Faculty competence)

Off-site Committee's Response

The Off-Site Reaffirmation Committee found three faculty members for whom no degree is listed or who appears to be teaching outside of their teaching discipline. Additionally, there were no academic qualifications included in the material available to the Committee for these individuals or for faculty in the division of Education.

Institution's Response

The Off-site Committee expressed no concerns about having competent faculty members qualitied to accomplish the mission and goals of the institution. The Committee did however note that: 1) for three faculty members no degree information was listed and [as perceived by the Committee] they appeared to be teaching outside of their teaching discipline; and 2) no academic qualifications were included for faculty in the Division of Education.

Pursuant to item one (1), the College found that the information for the three faculty had shifted in the matrix. The faculties in question are identified as: Mizan Berhane, Barbara Cade and Alexi Iakhiaev; their information is as follows:
